The example of Searle's Chinese Room that he cites is excellent, with the difference between syntax and semantics. Secondly, I believe that Valdemar wished to show the spiritual part of the human being, something that, in the last 300 years since the beginning of the industrial revolution, was not considered by Newtonian science. A Computer does not have this spiritual characteristic. It clearly shows the importance of meditation that brings us to a special state of consciousness and that any distractions bring us back to the past, recalling the influences that we have had at various stages of life, and that surface continually.
